Pastor's Corner

Dear St. Martin's Family,

I know that 2019 will bring many blessings to each of us individually and to our congregational family! That said, I wanted to share some important details about worship (and other things) this month:

January 6th is the festival of the **Epiphany**. Come hear about the Magi following the star and discovering that God's love had come into the world in Jesus. Please note that at our 10 am service we'll offer up a special prayer of thanksgiving for our now retired custodian, Tony Wells. Tony and his wife Ronnie will be in worship. If you'd like to bring an expression of thanks for his 6 years of service, we invite you to bring a card and hand it to Tony after worship. After a brief time of post-worship fellowship, we will then convene our semi-annual congregational meeting to ratify the budget.

January 13th is the festival of the **Baptism of Our Lord**. On this day we welcome the Rev. Eric Wester who is a special assistant to our Presiding Bishop, Elizabeth Eaton—and is the endorsing agent for all chaplains in the ELCA. Eric offered to come and preach prior to my Navy mobilization and I believe the timing is perfect! Of note, we will also be celebrating several baptisms on this holy day.

January 20th is the 2nd Sunday after the Epiphany and we hear the wonderful text from John's Gospel about Jesus changing water into wine. We belong to a transforming God who is ever-present and always active in our lives and through our lives to bring light and hope. Within worship we plan to dedicate the next batch of prayer shawls that are made with such care. Also, on this day there will be a special informational brunch for all Thrivent members. COMPOSTING: A MEANINGFUL NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION

Composting is good stewardship of the earth and is an important step beyond recycling. Plastics, which are recyclable, never disappear from the earth. Compostable materials renew the earth. Think about that difference.

For over a year, we've been composting at St. Martin's. **Look for** dark gray bins in the narthex for compostable materials and place the following in them:

- *Our compostable specially ordered paper cups, plates, napkins, spoons and forks.
- * Tops of pizza boxes.
- * Food remains, including cheese, fruit, cake, cookies, crackers, and coffee grounds.
- * Anything made of cotton.
- * Wilted flowers

No plastic, styrofoam, or aluminum go into compost bins.

Plastic and aluminum belong in the blue recycle bins. All other materials are trash (e.g., styrofoam)

January is our "composting education month." Help St. Martin's care for the earth and protect God's creation. Annapolis Compost picks up all the deposited materials on a regular basis. In return, St. Martin's receives occasional compost for our gardens. This is a win-win ministry.

St. Martin's Dedications Flowers, Bulletin, Candle

St. Martin's offers its members several opportunities to make dedications in honor or memory of loved ones, special events, such as weddings, baptisms, first communions or confirmations, or just to the Glory of God! These include flowers on Sundays to enhance the beauty of the sanctuary, the sanctuary candle (the large seven-day candle), and bulletins.

Flower arrangements are ordered from Gateway Florist for a cost of fifty dollars. Many of our members have preferred to make their own arrangements from flowers they purchase themselves or from flowers from their yards. Several vases that can be used are available in the sacristy or, if you choose to use your own vase, it will be returned to you. Please make sure you indicate on the dedication form if you would like to have flowers delivered from Gateway Florist or if you will be providing your own flowers.

The cost of the bulletin dedication is fifteen dollars; and the candle dedication is twelve dollars. Each Sunday, the bulletin announces the dedications that have been requested, be it flowers, bulletin or candle. The announcement includes the dedication provided by the giver and the giver's name, if desired.

Do you have a special event coming up for yourself or for a loved one or friend? Consider celebrating it with a Sunday dedication! You can find the Dedication Envelopes for flowers, bulletin and candle on the bulletin board across from the Library Lounge. Instructions for dedications and payments are on the envelope.

Want to Stop Homelessness? Come take a tour of the Light House and learn how you can plug in. January 24, 6:00PM at 10 Hudson Street in Annapolis.

We will meet the amazing staff, tour the facility, and learn about their programs to prevent homelessness and empower people as they transition toward employment, housing, and self-sufficiency. This is a great way to learn what the Light House is all about and the volunteer opportunities that fit with your talents and interests – whether its cooking meals, making bagged lunches, providing childcare, mentoring clients with job searches and finances, or serving on the Light House Board. And there are plenty of ways that the whole family can volunteer The Light House is a 24,000 square foot homelessness prevention center which provides emergency shelter to 45 individuals and 5 families with up to 20 children. In addition to shelter, food, and clothing, the Light House provides mental health stabilization, substance abuse prevention support, health care support, job training, and transitional housing. The Light House recognizes that to end the cycle of homelessness, people need to have sustainable employment skills that will allow them to make a living wage, so they can afford permanent **housing.** To reach that goal the Building Employment Success Training (B.E.S.T.) Program provides training to prepare students to work in the high demand fields of culinary arts and facilities maintenance.

St. Martin's founded the Light House with 12 other Annapolis churches over 25 years ago. St Martin's continues our leadership role by filling a permanent seat on the Board of Directors. A big thanks to Kelly Shenk, who is nearing the end of her two terms on the Board, Mark Sindt, previous Board Member, and Barb Freeman our Light House Liaison. Memorial Garden and Columbarium (MGC) Update and Phase 2 Fundraising



Dear Brothers and Sisters of St. Martin's,

On December 22, 2018, following two years of planning and fund raising, the Memorial Garden and Columbarium (MGC) Committee completed Phase 1 construction. Included in Phase 1 are: 1 Columbarium frame and 45 niches; a 3 boulder fountain representing our Baptism and the Trinity; installation of 2 boulders that will accommodate the Francis Street cross and "I am" engraved stone and butterfly representing the Resurrection; initial lighting; sod and mulch. The first inurnment was held on December 22nd for our beloved Zoltan and Doris Modly. A second inurnment is scheduled later in January for our dear brother, Rick Ruhf. A total of 21 niches are reserved and an additional 4 are pledged. In addition a variety of memorial gifts and project donations have been made totaling approximately \$80,000. Thanks be to God!

It is now time to begin Phase 2 fundraising and project construction of this important ministry. The following are included in Phase 2: a 2nd Columbarium frame and 45 niches; 7 "I am" stones placed appropriately in the garden; a point of egress from the narthex to an outdoor hospitality area; 2 stone pathways from each side of the narthex; stone pathways to both columbarium structures; 2 benches and 2 "L" shaped stone walls framing the gardens; landscaping; plumbing and lighting. As with Phase 1 funding, construction of Phase 2 will not include any church capital funds but rather the project will be funded by the generous souls of St. Martin's.

It should be noted if you are not interested in participating in inurnment at St. Martins there are two other opportunities to participate in the ministry. They are: (1) making a memorial donation in the name of a loved one; and/or (2) simply contributing to general project expenses. In 2019 please consider making a donation to the MGC for \$100 or \$500 or \$1,000 or more. If every household gave \$500 we would easily reach our Phase 2 goals. We realize this request may be out of reach for many of you and if this is the case after prayerful consideration, give what you can afford. It is also important to remember that giving to the MGC Ministry should not take the place of your weekly offering that you pledged for 2019.

WHAT AM I GETTING OUT OF IT?

It's a proven fact that singing a chorus is more fun when we are surrounded by friends, belting it out at the top of our lungs. Maybe that doesn't seem like a proven fact, but according to recent research -- it actually is. Humans are wired for rhythmic togetherness; from choral singers, musicians, dancers, to rowers, the science is coming in that we bond best when we are making music with each other. Studies show that choral singing improves our mood, with a decrease in stress, depression and anxiety. These effects are often attributed to the deeper breathing associated with singing, that is also used in meditation. Thes benefits are enhanced in a group setting, compared to singing alone. Singing in a group offers us a sense of belonging to something bigger than ourselves. It helps us feel that we are needed by the larger community. In that light, choral singing programs are beginning to make big strides at senior centers, as a way to improve the quality of life for the older members of our society. Beyond these psychological effects, our physical health is also impacted for the better: lower blood pressure, increased blood oxygen saturation, elevated immunity, higher pain threshold, stronger respiratory muscles, and less stuttering. Music making produces measurable changes in the brain! These changes positively impact our ability to heal after strokes by assisting the formation of <u>alternative</u> pathways around damaged brain tissue. All of these factors can lead to a deeper sense of well-being and overall happiness. Another notion is that the experience of making music together provides a sense of awe not just for the observers, but for the participants, as well. If one voice, instrument, or dancer alone is amazing, a group of performers is more so. What does that awe lead to? Research shows that this emotion engenders an enhanced sense of altruism. It seems to shift our focus from our own narrow view to that of our common humanity. Those who report more awe in their lives have been shown to be more generous, more ethical, and more helpful towards others. Perhaps as we join with others to create an experience of great beauty, we diminish any sense of scarcity, while aygmenting our connection to all in a way which is paradoxically self-affirming. We feel more comfortable and happier in our own skin. The statistics are in. In 2017, only 33% of Americans described themselves as happy. A full 40% said "they rarely engage in hobbies and pastimes they enjoy." It is time to turn that around.

Rooke Chapel Ringers in 2019

Friday, January 18, 2019 @ 7:00 PM in the Sanctuary

The Bucknell University Rooke Chapel Ringers were organized in 1983. The choir consists of 14 members who are selected by audition and who represent diverse major fields of study at Bucknell University, including the humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, business administration, education and engineering. The choir plays regularly for Protestant worship services on campus and participates in the traditional ringing-in-of-Christmas at Candlelight services in Rooke Chapel each December. This popular performance, taped and repeatedly televised by PBS for national distribution, was nominated for an Emmy in 1996 and 2004. A Christmas compact disc, which also includes the Rooke Chapel Choir, was released by Albany Records in November 1995. Since its founding, the choir has participated in two festivals at the Riverside Church in New York City and was chosen to play for the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association Conference in the spring of 1985. In January 1986, the choir embarked on its first two-week European concert tour of Switzerland and Austria. Twelve concerts included performances in Lucerne, Montreux, Salzburg, and Goetzens. The Rooke Chapel Ringers were honored to have been invited to perform at the Tenth-anniversary celebration of Handbell Exploration in Tempe, Arizona, in 1995, and the Hershey Handbell Exploration at the Hershey Hotel Syracuse Symphony for three holiday concerts. They returned to Syracuse for the 2006 holiday concerts and were featured again with the symphony in December 2009. The ringers participated in Bronzefest 2008 in Ohio, and completed the annual Senior Winter Tour, visiting Rochester, N.Y., Syracuse, N.Y., Pittsburgh, Pa., and Stroudsburg, Pa. Following the tour, the ringers played for a four-day masterclass in conducting at Bucknell, with Dr. Payn serving as clinician. The group performed with the Philadelphia Handbell Ensemble in February 2009.
